This year we decided that we wanted to do more to help our younger members and, in March, launched the AGI's Early Careers Network. By establishing a brand new volunteer support network and a programme of events targeted at young professionals, we hope to provide greater encouragement to develop careers in the geographic information industry.

Targeted events

To help younger members raise their profile within the industry, the AGI is organising targeted training and workshops in communications and networking skills; training in the CGeog application process; and importantly, an opportunity to access mentoring from industry leaders. The first webinar is scheduled for 21 May and is listed on our Events page for those who would like to find out more or recommend it to a colleague.

We are also working with our colleagues in The Royal Geographical Society and The Royal Scottish Geographical Society to align activities that will help younger professionals build their careers and their case for Chartered Geographer accreditation.
